he United States of America (USA) covers over 9 million square kilometres. Only the countries of Russia and Canada are larger, with China a similar size to the US. It comprises of 50 states. Light lager is the most common type of beer, although across the country there are many specialist beers being produced.







Regular flights are offered from many of the UK's major airports. These are commonly direct to major cities such as New York but can be in-direct depending on your final destination.

Unsurprisingly due to the size of the country there are many ways to travel around, with the country enjoying strong internal air, rail and road connections. Some methods of travel have even become iconic in their own right, such as Route 66, a highway covering nearly 4,000kms across the country.

The United States rise to a global superpower has been fairly rapid, but its history goes back thousands of years. The indigenous people started arriving around 40,000 years ago, but it wasn't until the 16th century when westerners started exploring and settling in parts of the country. In the 17th century, the English influence on the land started to bring in substantial colonies and with it, the native population declined.

As the colonies grew they became frustrated by the British rule they were subject to and rebelled, resulting in the Revolutionary War in the 18th Century. This resulted in the 'Declaration of Independence' on July 4th 1776, which probably remains the most important date in modern American history. In fact, every year on the same date Independence Day is celebrated across the country.


Civil war between the north and south, which would eventually lead to the end of slavery, occurred in the 19th Century. The gold rush in the mid-19th Century spurred on new migration which created new railway links, which in turn helped expansion across the country.


Again in the 20th Century war largely affected the US but this time largely off shore as the country contributed to the Allies efforts in World War 2. After the war the country developed substantially, cities were modernised and new industries grew as transport links with the rest of the world became much more accessible.


Meanwhile on the mainland a cultural shift was occurring on many levels, from the Civil Rights Movement to the growth in popular music.
